Appropriate engineering controls	Engineering controls are used to remove a hazard or place a barrier between the worker and the hazard. Well-designed engineering controls can be highly effective in protecting workers and will typically be independent of worker interactions to provide this high level of protection.  The basic types of engineering controls are:  Process controls which involve changing the way a job activity or process is done to reduce the risk. #### TRIETHYLENETETRAMINE

Ethyleneamines are very reactive and can cause chemical burns, skin rashes and asthma-like symptoms. It is readily absorbed through the skin and may cause eye blindness and irreparable damage. As such, they require careful handling. In general, the low-molecular weight polyamines have been positive in the Ames assay (for genetic damage); however, this is probably due to their ability to chelate copper.

For alkyl polyamines:

The alkyl polyamines cluster consists of two terminal primary and at least one secondary amine groups and are derivatives of low molecular weight ethylenediamine, propylenediamine or hexanediamine. Toxicity depends on route of exposure. Cluster members have been shown to cause skin irritation or sensitisation, eye irritation and genetic defects, but have not been shown to cause cancer.

Triethylenetetramine is a severe irritant to skin and eyes and may induce skin sensitisation. Acute exposure to saturated vapour via inhalation was tolerated without impairment but exposure to aerosol may lead to reversible irritations of the mucous membranes in the airways. Studies done on experimental animals showed that it does not cause cancer or foetal developmental defects.

Exposure to the material for prolonged periods may cause physical defects in the developing embryo (teratogenesis).

#### BENZENE-1,3-DIMETHANAMINE

Allergic reactions involving the respiratory tract are usually due to interactions between IgE antibodies and allergens and occur rapidly. Allergic potential of the allergen and period of exposure often determine the severity of symptoms. Some people may be genetically more prone than others, and exposure to other irritants may aggravate symptoms. Allergy causing activity is due to interactions with proteins.

Attention should be paid to atopic diathesis, characterised by increased susceptibility to nasal inflammation, asthma and eczema.

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Exogenous allergic alveolitis is induced essentially by allergen specific immune-complexes of the IgG type; cell-mediated reactions (T lymphocytes) may be involved. Such allergy is of the delayed type with onset up to four hours following exposure. For benzene-1,3-dimethanamine (m-xylene-alpha,alpha'- diamine) The toxicity via oral administration and inhalation was tissue damage in the digestive and respiratory organs, respectively, which are the first contact sites. The chemical is corrosive to rat and mouse skin and a sensitiser in the guinea pig maximisation test. In the 28-day repeated dose toxicity study [OECD TG 407], the chemical was given to rats by gayage at doses of 0, 10, 40, 150 and 600 mg/kg b,w/day. One male and four females died, and salivation, low locomotor activity and piloerection were noted in the 600 mg/kg group. The following information refers to contact allergens as a group and may not be specific to this product. TRIETHYLENETETRAMINE Contact allergies quickly manifest themselves as contact eczema, more rarely as urticaria or Quincke's oedema. The pathogenesis of contact eczema involves & BENZENEa cell-mediated (T lymphocytes) immune reaction of the delayed type. Other allergic skin reactions, e.g. contact urticaria, involve antibody-mediated immune 1,3-DIMETHANAMINE reactions TRIETHYLENETETRAMINE The material may produce severe irritation to the eye causing pronounced inflammation. Repeated or prolonged exposure to irritants may produce & BENZENEconjunctivitis 1,3-DIMETHANAMINE TRIETHYLENETETRAMINE The material may cause severe skin irritation after prolonged or repeated exposure and may produce on contact skin redness, swelling, the production of & BENZENEvesicles, scaling and thickening of the skin. Repeated exposures may produce severe ulceration. 1,3-DIMETHANAMINE Asthma-like symptoms may continue for months or even years after exposure to the material ceases. This may be due to a non-allergenic condition known as TRIETHYLENETETRAMINE reactive airways dysfunction syndrome (RADS) which can occur following exposure to high levels of highly irritating compound. Key criteria for the diagnosis & BENZENEof RADS include the absence of preceding respiratory disease, in a non-atopic individual, with abrupt onset of persistent asthma-like symptoms within minutes 1,3-DIMETHANAMINE to hours of a documented exposure to the irritant. A reversible airflow pattern, on spirometry, with the presence of moderate to severe bronchial hyperreactivity on methacholine challenge testing and the lack of minimal lymphocytic inflammation, without eosinophilia, have also been included in the criteria for diagnosis of RADS 0 Acute Toxicity (0) Carcinogenicity Skin Irritation/Corrosion Reproductivity 0 Serious Eve 0 STOT - Single Exposure Damage/Irritation

#### Waste treatment methods

Product / Packaging
